One potential red flag is if the organization or program asks for a fee for participation. Often, international volunteer programs have a fee to cover the cost of travel and living expenses. However, others do not describe what the fee is used for. We encourage you to ask what the fee covers, and to receive this information in writing.

- The World Bank Knowledge Internship Program provides undergraduate and graduate students the opportunity to acquire hands-on knowledge management skills to work in an international environment on development issues, and to gain experience working in a mutual learning and knowledge sharing environment with world experts.
- Intern duties may include doing research, writing documents, cataloguing information, and publishing knowledge stories/best practices.
- The internships, which are offered year-round in the Bank's Washington, DC office, are not paid, but students may receive academic credit.
