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Davis-Putter Scholarship Fund	Although citizenship is not a consideration, applicants must be living in the United States and planning to enroll in school in the US in order to apply. There is a strong preference for grantees who plan on staying in the US and building the movement here.	The Davis-Putter Scholarship Fund provides grants to students actively working for peace and justice. These need-based scholarships are awarded to those able to do academic work at the university level and who are part of the progressive movement on the campus and in the community. Early recipients worked for civil rights, against McCarthyism, and for peace in Vietnam. Boren Fellowships - For international study	A U.S. citizen at the time of application. Either enrolled in or applying to a graduate degree program at an accredited U.S. college or university located within the United States. To receive the award you must provide evidence of admission and enrollment in such a program. Boren Fellows must remain enrolled in their graduate programs for the duration of the fellowship.	Boren Fellowships provide support U.S. graduate students to add an important international and language component to their graduate education through specialization in area study, language study, or increased language proficiency. Boren Fellowships are funded by the National Security Education Program (NSEP), which focuses on geographic areas, languages, and fields of study deemed critical to U.S. national security. In exchange for fellowship funding, all Boren Fellows must agree to work in the Federal Government in a position with national security responsibilities. The duration of the NSEP Service Requirement is one year or the duration of assistance provided under the program, whichever is longer. Boren Fellows must begin fulfilling the service requirement within two years of graduation.	The maximum level of support for a combined overseas and domestic program is \$30,000 over 24 months. Boren Fellowship awards are made for a minimum of 12 weeks and maximum of 24 months. Overseas programs can be no longer than one year.
