LESS-COMMONLY TAUGHT INDIGENOUS LANGUAGES

INTENSIVE SUMMER NAHUATL INSTITUTE IN GUERRERO, MEXICO

Where: Oapan, Mexico

When: June 18-July 27, 2007

To whom: Master's, doctoral, and advanced undergraduate students.
(Students must register for both LACS 37001 and LACS 37002)

This 6-week course sequence is appropriate for master's, doctoral, and advanced undergraduate students. It is an intensive immersion course that, although based on modern Nahuatl from San Agustín, Oapan, and neighboring villages, will familiarize students with colonial and classical Nahuatl by using a wide range of texts and workbooks. Students will be able to work intensively with native speakers as part of the basic educational experience of this course. Those who have previously acquired skills in Nahuatl will be given the flexibility for a greater concentration of their efforts on translation, individual projects, and direct work with native speakers. Thus, although a beginning course, students with previous experience in Nahuatl are encouraged to apply. Formal classes meet for 5 hours per day, Monday through Friday; additional intensive work or tutorials will be scheduled in the afternoons with the instructor and native speakers. Students will be provided with recording and playback facilities for language laboratory work and to conduct their own research and independent study. The course meets all the requirements for FLAS fellowships for eligible graduate students. Students will make their own travel arrangements and need to be in Oapan by June 17, 2007. Students are encouraged to bring their own laptops to the field. Please inform the instructor in advance if you do not have a laptop, and every effort will be made to provide one for your use. Full class attendance is required. Students who miss class for reasons other than illness will be asked to withdraw from the Institute.

Costs: tuition (for two credits), \$4,000; room and board, \$550; program fee, \$350; course package and dictionaries, \$150. Graduate students who are U.S. citizens can apply for FLAS Fellowships to support the cost of this program. Travel costs and arrangements are separate and are the responsibility of the student. Once paid, tuition is non-refundable. The program fee is not optional. It covers partial costs for two group excursions, one to another Nahuatl-speaking village for a local festival, and one weekend in Acapulco. The fee covers travel, hotel, a dinner in Acapulco, and the instructor's expenses.

INTENSIVE COURSE IN OLDER AND MODERN NAHUATL

Where: Zacatecas Institute for Teaching and Research in Ethnology (Language Center of the Universidad Autónoma de Zacatecas)

When: June 25 to August 3, 2007

For Whom: Graduate students interested in Beginning, Intermediate, or Advanced Nahuatl

Older Nahuatl-Students will meet two hours per day, five days per week during five weeks at the Institute in Zacatecas, and one hour per day for one week in the indigenous community of Tepecxilla, Veracruz, in order to study Older Nahuatl. Modern Nahuatl-The first two weeks will entail an immersion experience, in which students will learn to converse in Nahuatl without the use of translations or grammar. Class structure and activity varies depending on the student's skill level. Instruction emphasizes both written and oral communication. Courses include field trips and immersion experiences with Nahua families. Instructors include John Sullivan, Ph.D., Lic. Delfina de la Cruz, and indigenous teaching assistants. Students will be required to do their own individual research project. Total class hours: 140.

Costs: US\$2250 for tuition. \$900 – \$1,100 for transportation, room and board for 6 weeks (costs will depend on numerous room and board options). Graduate students at US universities may obtain FLAS funding for this course through their home academic institution.

MIXTEC LANGUAGE PROGRAM

Where: Oaxaca, Mexico through San Diego State University.

When: TBA

Mixtec is an indigenous language of Mexico spoken by people living in the states of Oaxaca, Guerrero, and Puebla, many of whom have migrated and established communities throughout northern Mexico and the United States. This intensive program is taught by native Mixtec speakers and linguists, Juan Julian Caballero of the Centro de Investigaciones y Estudios Superiores en Antropología Social (CIESAS) and Marcos Cruz Bautista of the Universidad Pedagógica Nacional (UPN). Both Profesores Caballero and Bautista received training in linguistics and second language acquisition pedagogy from Mexico's Universidad Pedagógica Nacional (UPN). The course includes five hours of classroom instruction, four days per week, over a six week period with a minimum of two weekend field trips into the Mixteca. Local and visiting scholars whose research focuses on Mixtec culture and history conduct seminars each week. Additional fieldtrips to market centers, archaeological sites, elementary and secondary schools, and other such locations where the language and culture can be experienced within the broader Oaxacan environment are also worked into the weekly schedule. Dr. Ramona Pérez, a Oaxacan scholar from the Department of Anthropology at SDSU, coordinates the program in San Diego and Oaxaca.

OXCLAJUJ AJ: KAQCHIKEL MAYA LANGUAGE & CULTURE I

Where: Antigua (Guatemala) through Tulane University.

When: July 25-August 3, 2007

For whom: Open to graduate students and advanced undergraduate students with appropriate academic backgrounds and a working knowledge of Spanish

The Stone Center for Latin American Studies offers this intensive six-week course in Kaqchikel Maya language and culture led by Judith M. Maxwell, associate professor of anthropology and director of the Linguistics program at Tulane, and Walter E. Little who is a cultural anthropologist at SUNY-Albany with the assistance of Kaqchikel teachers. The course offers a 3-credit language only option or a 6-credit language and culture option.

Costs: \$3,100 (three-credit option), \$3,500 (six-credit option)

Program fee includes medical insurance, specialized tours and outings, travel between course sites, and 3 or 6 Tulane University credits. Housing and airfare are not included.

INTENSIVE INTRODUCTORY AND INTERMEDIATE YUCATEC MAYA

Where: University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, Universidad Autonoma de Yucatan (Merida, Mexico), & 4 week field study in Yucatán.

When: June 4-July 14

For whom: Open to anyone (20 students max).

The Summer Intensive Course in Yucatec Maya will offer instruction both at the beginning and the intermediate level. These courses are designed to take into account the needs of students from different disciplines and at different levels of expertise. Level I begins with two weeks, six hours a day of intensive classroom instruction on the UNC with Professor David Mora Marin. Level II begins with intensive six hour a day classroom instruction at the Universidad Autónoma de México in Mérida, México given by Professor Ismael May May and John Tuxill. During the third week of the program, students in Level I will join Level II in Mérida where both groups will continue to receive intensive language instruction as well as visit markets, museums and other places of interest. In week four, both groups will be housed in the town of Santa Elena, near Uxmal, where they will interact with families and continue to receive daily instruction from their professors. Weeks five and six will be spent in the town of Xocen, near Vallaolid. Xocen is a small Mayan village where many people only speak Maya. Students

will find it to be an excellent environment in which to practice their language skills. These six-week courses are equivalent to six credit hours or 160 contact hours..

Costs: The program fee for either Level I or Level II is approximately \$3,200. Housing at UNC, airfare, and some meals and incidentals are not included in the program fee. Optional housing in dormitories at UNC is available. Approximate housing costs at UNC: \$800 single, \$400 for shared dormitory. Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) funding is available for many qualified graduate students. Please contact the Institute for additional information about funding. MAYA LANGUAGE AND CULTURE IMMERSION IN THE GUATEMALAN HIGHLANDS

Where: Quetzaltenango, Guatemala.

When: Week courses running through May and September 2007.

For whom: Students interested in indigenous Maya languages--six are available, including Tzutujil, K'iché, Q'anjobál, Mam, Qeqchí and Kaqchikel--and cultural studies in weaving, natural medicine, and indigenous Maya Spirituality. One-to-one student teacher ratio and homestays available. Beyond the study of language, CMI administrators try to involve all students in the beautiful and fascinating culture of Guatemala.

Costs: \$40 registration fee. In Quetzaltenango: \$140-\$160 per week, third Sunday of September--second week in May, \$160 third Sunday of May--second week of September. Tuition covers five hours per weekday of individual instruction. Also included is seven days of room and board and three meals per day with a local family. Residence accommodations will include private sleeping room, sterilized or bottled drinking water, and warm bathing water. Residence weeks normally run from Sunday through Saturday, and teaching weeks from Monday to Friday. Students wishing to begin residence or teaching weeks on other days may do so, however, with an adjusted per diem payment schedule designed to ensure fair compensation to teachers and family.

TWO WEEK COURSE IN KAQCHIKEL MAYA

Where: Antigua, Guatemala

When July 23 - Aug. 10, 2007

To whom: The program is intended primarily for Spanish teachers. Application is open, however, to undergraduate and graduate students from Spanish and other disciplines who have a demonstrated ability in the use of the Spanish language and a need for this type of course.

The Center for Latin American Studies and the Department of Spanish and Portuguese at The Ohio State University announce this year's intensive Summer Seminars Abroad, a two-week workshop in language and linguistics in Antigua, Guatemala. The purpose of the program is to provide selected students with an opportunity to analyze and practice the Spanish language in a natural linguistic and cultural context, and to receive university credit for that experience. Participants will have the opportunity to take a brief course in Kaqchikel Maya, however the course is not eligible for FLAS funding. SUMMER COURSE IN GUATEMALAN LANGUAGES

Where: Antigua, Guatemala through University of Arizona and Centro de Investigaciones Regionales de Mesoamerica (CIRMA)

When: Spring semester **January 10 - May**, Summer semester June 18-July 30, Fall semester **August 20 - December 7, 2007**

For Whom: Graduate students and undergraduates. The program is open to both University of Arizona students as well as non-University of Arizona students

The sixteen-week semester program and six-week summer intensive program provide undergraduate and graduate college credits from the University of Arizona and are open to students from any university. The program includes courses on Spanish language, Latin American history, culture and politics -- all taught by knowledgeable Central American scholars and designed to promote an understanding of the region from the "ground up." Formal classes are complemented by field trips and a colloquium series. Please note that Mayan language classes can be offered for credit at the undergraduate level, and graduate students with FLAS scholarships may be able to study at CIRMA. BOLIVIAN QUECHUA IN COCHABAMBA

When: June 22- -August 10

Where: Cochabamba, Bolivia.

To Whom: Undergraduate juniors and seniors, and graduate students.

The program combines studies of Andean culture, past and present, with language studies in Quechua. Intermediate Spanish proficiency is required to participate. Students may choose to take either elementary or continuing Quechua (3 credits each). Language courses will be taught by Luis Morató Peña, a native of Cochabamba, Senior Lecturer at Cornell University, and the author of three trilingual textbooks on elementary, intermediate, and advanced Quechua language instruction. The program includes several field trips to La Paz, Lake Titicaca, and archaeological sites (Tiwanaku and Inkallaqta), with optional visits to Sucre and Potosi.

Costs: (Not updated) The minimum program charge is \$5,010 for six credits. This program is approved for FLAS Fellowships and special arrangements will be made for students who have been awarded one. Some scholarships are available. Students who elect to live with Bolivian families pay a \$50 placement fee and \$15 per day for food and lodging. Food and lodging costs for those students who do not choose to live with Bolivian families will range from \$125 to \$150 per week. Some scholarships are available. There is a non-refundable \$50 application fee. Applications will be accepted after that date on a space-available basis only. Enrollment is limited and early application is strongly encouraged. There is a \$50 nonrefundable application fee, payable to Cornell University, which is not applied toward the program charge.

BOLIVIAN QUECHUA

Where: Cochabamba, Bolivia through Florida International University's Andean Studies Program.

When: May 26-June 1.

For Whom: Graduates, advanced undergraduates, professors, researchers.

Intensive basic Bolivian Quechua courses are offered as part of a larger Andean Studies Program depending on the interest of registered students. In addition to Quechua language courses, students can select from a number of graduate-level Andean area studies courses offered by Florida International University and Universidad Privada Boliviana (UPB) and/or conduct research at Fundación Inca, one of the region's largest private research libraries with over 110,000 volumes and 5,000 periodicals on the Andes (Chile, Bolivian, Peru, Ecuador, Colombia, Venezuela). Classes are conducted in Cochabamba at Fundación Inca or UPB. Intensive basic Quechua classes are held four hours per day, Monday-Friday, in each six week mini-semester during the above dates. Independent study courses for intermediate and advanced Quechua instruction are also available. More details about these courses should be asked directly to the Andean Studies program. Sponsored weekend trips allow students additional practice with the language and immersion in Andean culture. The Andean Studies Program is offered year round with regular (3 hour, 2 days/week) basic and intermediate and independent study Quechua courses also offered in September-December and January-April sessions.

Costs: Approximated cost of the Quechua courses (additional to the Andean Studies Program) Fee is \$300. Student is responsible for travel expenses to and from Cochabamba (est. \$600-\$800 round trip from Miami).

Total estimated cost (less incidental expenses and weekend trips) for one six week mini-semester is \$3700-\$3900 for both Florida in-state and out-of-state residents.

INTENSIVE QUECHUA IN CUSCO, PERU

Where: Escuela Andina de Postgrado, Cusco (Peru) through The University of Michigan.

When: TBA

To whom: All graduate and professional school students

Three levels of intensive Southern Quechua will be taught: Intensive Beginning Quechua, Intensive Intermediate Quechua, and Intensive Advanced Quechua. Classes will meet intensively for eight weeks. Enrollment will be limited to 15 for each of the five levels. The program is open to all graduate and professional school students. A series of lectures on Quechua culture and history and an extensive program of excursions and cultural events will supplement the courses. Students may choose to take the course for University of Michigan credit by enrolling in the corresponding courses (LACS 471/472, 473/474, and 475/476), or may take the course without University credit by enrolling directly through Escuela Andina de Postgrado. The same academic criteria will apply to credit and non-credit students.

INTENSIVE ECUADORIAN QUICHUA

Where: Arizona State University's Andes and Amazon Field School on the Río Napo in Ecuador.

When: Summer Session 1: June 6 - June 30, Session 2: July 4 - July 28, 2007

For whom: Graduate and undergraduate students from any college or university

Beginning, Intermediate and Advanced Quichua taught in a community where Quichua is the language of every day conversation. The primary goal is to learn to converse as quickly as possible. Typically, students spend 3 hours a day in classroom instruction. In the afternoons and evenings, there are additional structured activities for practicing the Quichua language. Graduate students who are U.S. citizens are encouraged to apply for Foreign Language and Area Studies Summer Fellowships. Participants also take field courses in Amazonian culture or Tropical Plant Diversity. Faculty include Tod Swanson, Luz Marma De la Torre, and Michael Uzendoski.

Costs: \$1,440.00 for one session or \$2,858.00 for both (subject to change) includes tuition and fees, ground transportation in Ecuador, lodging, and three meals a day. Not included: airfare (approx. \$950 with a group rate), \$32 airport tax, passport, health insurance, and personal expenses. Tuition is also separate and is

calculated by credit hours taken: ASU undergraduate tuition is \$207.00/credit (\$311.00/credit out-of-state) plus a \$11.00 fee per session and ASU graduate tuition is \$264.00/credit (\$396.00/credit out-of-state) plus a \$11.00 fee per session.

The Center of Latin American Studies at University of Chicago offers the only course in the USA. Aymara is an indigenous language of the Andes, spoken widely in Bolivia and parts of Peru, Chile, and Argentina. Using a variety of authentic cultural materials, including film, literature, music, visual arts and mass media, along with the text *Aymar Arux Akhamawa* and its accompanying CD-ROM with digital audio dialogues, students advance their proficiency in formal language structures, conversation, aural and written skills, and grammar. INTENSIVE GUARANI

Where: Asunción, Paraguay through the Instituto de Lingüística Guaraní del Paraguay (IDELGUAP) of the Universidad Evangélica, Facultad de Lenguas Vivas

When: Anytime between May and August (dates to be determined by student; course usually lasts six weeks)

For Whom: Graduate students who speak Spanish.

Guaraní is spoken by nearly six million people throughout the country of Paraguay and parts of northern Argentina. It is also the official national language of Paraguay. Students will have a 1:1 student-to-teacher ratio with instructors who are both academically trained professors and native speakers of Guaraní. Team of professors headed by Prof. Juan Alberto Cacéres. Students have the option to emphasize training in reading/writing comprehension or verbal communication, depending on interests. Courses are excellent training for students of anthropology, history, literature, sociology, linguistics, medicine, etc. who plan to use Guaraní in their research or professional work. Classes last between 4-6 hours a day depending on the availability of the student.

Costs: (Not updated) 160 hours of class is \$1,440.00. FLAS eligibility dependent on approval from individual Title VI Resource Centers and the US Department of Education.

HAITIAN CREOLE

Where: Miami, Florida and Haiti through the Florida Consortium for Latin American Studies' Haitian Summer Institute.

When: June 28-August 16, 2007

For Whom: Graduates and undergraduates (degree and non-degree seeking), professors, researchers, public school teachers, other professionals.

The Florida Consortium for Latin American Studies (Florida International University and University of Florida) sponsors the Haitian Summer Institute, designed as an intensive introduction to the Haitian Creole language and Haitian culture and politics. The Institute focuses on Haiti through an interdisciplinary approach, incorporating the disciplines of language, linguistics, literature, history, international relations, religious studies, economics, sociology/anthropology and political science. The program includes a four-week program at FIU's Biscayne Bay Campus in Miami, Florida, divided into two sessions. Accelerated Haitian Creole language is taught in the morning sessions. In the afternoon sessions, the historical, cultural and political development of Haiti is addressed through a series of lectures by Haitian experts from FIU, UF, and other universities throughout the country. In addition to the Miami instruction, there is an optional 3-credit study abroad component that takes place in Haiti for two weeks. When: This course will not be offered until summer 2008.

During Summer 2006, the Center for Latin American Studies will offer an intensive summer institute in K'iche', a Mayan language spoken by about one million people in the central highlands of Guatemala. K'iche' has played a central role in the Mayan cultural revitalization movement and has a long literary tradition including such works as the Popol Wuuj (Popol Vuh) and numerous plays such as Rabinal Achi. The CLAS K'iche' course will be taught by Rusty Barrett, a Postdoctoral Fellow in the Linguistics Department conducting socio-linguistic research on K'iche' dialectology and language change. The K'iche' course uses newly developed teaching materials in addition to a revised version of the Stanley Wick and Remigio Cochojil-González textbook written for the late Norman McQuown's K'iche' course at the University of Chicago. The course will be appropriate for students with a wide range of disciplinary backgrounds, including anthropology, comparative religion, Latin American studies, linguistics, and human development. Emphasis will be on developing proficiency in modern spoken K'iche' for future field or archival research. The University of Chicago houses one of the world's finest collection of recorded K'iche' materials, including recordings dating back to the 1920's. In the summer of 2006, CLAS will offer intensive courses in both Beginner's and Intermediate K'iche', allowing additional students to take advantage of this rare opportunity.
