Who Should Attend

Mental health professionals with a graduate degree in social work, psychology, psychiatric nursing, or rehabilitation counseling who are eager to engage with their peers in active learning about contemporary theories and practice.

Requirement for admission:

Graduate degree in Social Work or other mental health profession

Program

This Certificate in ACP is a two semester course of study. This Certificate program will emphasize contemporary clinical theories and clinical practice principles and process. An optional second year in Contemporary Approaches to Clinical Practice will apply contemporary clinical theories and practice principles and will examine clinical cases drawn from students' practice in depth. Classes will allow for lively debate among student and faculty. The Blackboard system is provided to all students to receive articles and to engage in discussion.

The Program Offers:

- Opportunities to learn about contemporary relational, attachment, feminist, and trauma theories and their practice implications
- A focus on the application of current clinical theories to real cases
- An emphasis on treatment principles and process, particularly with respect to the therapeutic relationship and dialogue
- A perspective that encompasses issues related to multiculturalism and diversity
- Consideration of treatment of selected emotional disorders and other client problems including the effects of childhood trauma
- Opportunities to engage with other students and faculty in the examination of clinical cases drawn from students' practice
- A commitment to critical thinking

Requirements/Structure

Post-Master's Certificate in Advanced Clinical Practice

This Certificate requires the completion of two semesters (one course per semester) over one year. Each course will be comprised of eight 2 ½ hour class sessions that meet every other week unless otherwise noted. The certificate will be awarded on the basis of class attendance, class participation and completion of required course readings, which will include books and journal articles.

There are **two sections**: Thursdays 6-8:30pm (bi-weekly) or Friday 9-11:30am (bi-weekly)

Advanced Certificate in Contemporary Approaches to Clinical Practice

To earn an Advanced Certificate in Contemporary Approaches to Clinical Practice, you must have already completed Semesters I and II of Advanced Clinical Practice.

There is **one section** of the Advanced Certificate in Contemporary Approaches.

Program Description

Certificate in Advanced Clinical Practice

SEMESTER I: Comparative Contemporary Psychoanalytic Theories (Fall 2009)

This course will focus on psychoanalytic relational and post-modern theories and their treatment implications. It will include British and American object relations theories, attachment theory, self psychology, intersubjectivity, and contemporary relational theory. It also will discuss newer perspectives on gender and cultural diversity.

SEMESTER II: Principles of Clinical Practice (Spring 2010)

This course will apply the content discussed in Semester I to the assessment and treatment of special problems and populations. It will consider developmental assessment and the treatment of trauma survivors, affective disorders, anxiety disorders, borderline and narcissistic personality disorders, and substance abusers.

Advanced Certificate in Contemporary Approaches to Clinical Practice (Requires completion of Advanced Clinical Practice above)

SEMESTER III: Practice Seminar I (Fall 2009)

Drawing on the content of previous semesters of the Program, this course will discuss students' weekly presentations. Students will prepare patient/client reports for group discussion and readings will be assigned. The seminar will emphasize developmental assessment, working with defenses and resistance, transference and counter-transference, the therapist's use of self, and the nature of interpretation.

SEMESTER IV: Practice Seminar II (Spring 2010)

A continuation of Practice Seminar I, this course will use students' patient/client presentations to consider the treatment of special problems and populations, including affective disorders, anxiety, borderline and narcissistic disorders, trauma survivors, substance abuse, psychotic disorders, and sexual dysfunction.
