ACADEMIC AND PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

Professor and Project Director, Narrative Inquiry in Social Work, New York University Silver School of Social Work, September 2009-present.

Dean and Professor, New York University Silver School of Social Work, November 2001 to 2009. Responsible for graduate and undergraduate programs, fund raising, fiscal and operational management of one of the largest social work schools in the country, with an enrollment of approximately 1400 students, and an operating budget of \$30 million dollars. As dean I have raised over \$12 million dollars (not including a pledge bequest of \$40 million) in donor funds, and during my tenure we have raised nearly \$8 million dollars in research funds. Responsible for developing the Division for Lifelong Learning and Professional Development, re-engaging the School with the community and social service agencies in the metropolitan area, and the development of the school's Poverty Agenda. Completely revamped the doctoral program (now ranked fifth in a recent ranking of social work PhD programs), and redirected the undergraduate program to focus on human rights, social justice and advocacy.

Dean and Professor, Tulane University School of Social Work, 1994 to November 2001. Responsible for all programs of graduate professional education in social work at Tulane. Formulated and implemented strategies for community engagement, with particular emphasis on community-building and supportive programs for public housing residents. Oversaw the complete reformulation of the MSW program resulting in an innovative program focusing on race, poverty, and community-based clinical practice that positioned the School for its central role in Tulane's post-Katrina Academic Renewal Plan.
