November, 1980 – Present - Private Practice

Long term, short term, and crisis intervention therapy provided to a range of clients including individuals suffering from substance abuse, anxiety disorders, character pathology, PTSD, bereavement, compulsive behaviors. Other clients have presented with concerns regarding life span issues such as leaving for college, aging, break-ups and divorces, bereavement, raising adolescent children, medical problems such as cancer, attention deficit disorder and pain.

March, 1997 – January, 1999

Unitas Mental Health Clinic

Provided psychotherapy to children, adolescents, adults, and families in a community-based setting focusing on families affected by AIDS, substance abuse, poverty, mental retardation, and homelessness.

September, 1994 – January, 1997

Gay Men's Health Crisis

Led weekly bereavement group for adult men and women who had lost loved ones (lovers, spouses, children, friends, peers) to AIDS. Many group members suffered complicated grief due to multiple and frequently traumatic losses. Many were also HIV positive themselves.

September, 1983 – May, 1984

Jewish Board of Family & Children's Services - Ph.D. Internship

Family, couple, group and child therapy provided to community residents seeking short-term, cognitive psychotherapy. Presenting problems included alcoholism/ substance abuse, child neglect and abuse, marital discord, and depression.

January, 1979 – September, 1984

Clinical Social Work Supervisor, Beth Israel Methadone Treatment Program

Provided individual and group supervision in several outpatient settings, developed first in-service training programs and a range of group treatment offerings, initiated multi-disciplinary team treatment approach, supervised social work students including numerous students who had experienced difficulty in other placements. Provided clinical consultation to clinic staff and short-term crisis intervention to clients.
