NYU recognized that the great recession would limit families' abilities to meet the cost of higher education. The university, therefore, took the following actions in developing the budget for fiscal 2010:

- The budget increases undergraduate tuition at 3.85% above fiscal 2009 tuition. This is lower than the planned increase of 4.5% The dollar impact of this change, net of higher enrollment, was a revenue decrease compared with the Plan of \$8.1 million
- Room and board rate \$5.1 million decrease (Plan rate of increase = 4.5% vs. budget rate 2.5%)
- Undergraduate financial aid increase \$8 million (Plan rate of increase = 4.9% vs. budget rate 7.8%). Undergraduate financial aid from the University's general operating fund increases in fiscal 2010 at twice the rate of increase of undergraduate tuition. This is the second consecutive year of this level of increase.
