



**Minutes of a Stated Meeting of the
Senate of New York University
March 30, 2017**

A stated meeting of the Senate of New York University was held on Thursday, March 30, 2017, at 9 a.m., in the Colloquium Room of the Global Center for Academic and Spiritual Life, 238 Thompson Street. The meeting was convened with President Andrew Hamilton in the chair.

President Hamilton welcomed members of the Senate to the meeting.

Review and Approval of the Minutes of the February 16, 2017 Meeting

Upon motion duly made and seconded, the Minutes of the February 16, 2017 meeting were approved unanimously as presented.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Executive Committee Report

Professor Fred Carl reported that at its meeting on March 6th, the Executive Committee discussed the Student Senators Council (SSC) resolution on student representation on the University Board of Trustees and referred it to the Senate Committee on Organization and Governance.

The Committee also received an update from President Hamilton with respect to the revised Executive Order on immigration that had been issued earlier that day and the potential impact on students from the six named countries who are here on single-entry visas.

Academic Affairs Committee Report

Academic Affairs Committee Chair Ben Stewart began by thanking NYU student Leah Nouriyelian for her email to the Senate about the difficulties that observant Jewish students face in relation to the current academic calendar. He explained that while it is clear that the concerns raised affect a substantial number of NYU community members, Ms. Nouriyelian's proposal to cancel class for the Jewish High Holidays would introduce other challenges in relation to the academic calendar that the Academic Affairs Committee has proposed.

Professor Stewart then presented the Committee's proposal for the University calendar for academic years 2018-2020. He noted that the Committee has established a working group to help resolve challenges in creating a Fall 2020 calendar that satisfies the scheduling needs for the lab sciences, and the Committee hopes to present the University calendar for academic year 2020-2021 for approval at the April 27th Senate meeting.

Professor Stewart then gave an overview of some of the key factors and constraints that are considered when preparing the calendar. He noted that the Fall schedule in particular is more challenging than the other terms, with classes generally starting after Labor Day and ending prior to December 22nd. There are also logistical constraints for the Summer term in order to ease the process of students moving in and out of dormitories.

Professor Stewart then invited questions and discussion from the Senate. In response to a comment about a SSC resolution passed in 2016 requesting that Fall Break on the University academic calendar be renamed "Indigenous Peoples' Day," SSC Chair Ryan

Thomas said that he would forward the resolution to the Academic Affairs Committee for consideration.

In accordance with Rule II.7.e. of the Senate Rules of Procedure, upon motion duly made and seconded, the Senate voted to allow Ms. Nouriyelian, guest of a member of the Senate, to address the Senate.

Ms. Nouriyelian summarized a letter she wrote to President Hamilton that urged the University to cancel class for the Jewish High Holidays of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. She said that in less than nine days, the Student Services Committee received more than 1,000 signatures and over 175 comments on a petition in support of this calendar change. She added that other institutions, including both NYC public schools and CUNY schools, have canceled class for these Jewish High Holidays without disadvantaging other members of their communities. Ms. Nouriyelian urged members of the Senate to vote no on the proposed University academic calendar in support of this request to cancel class on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

Professor Stewart responded to Ms. Nouriyelian's proposal. He noted that increasing the number of holidays in the Fall term would require classes to start before Labor Day, which could then impact the Summer term schedule since the University aims to have two weeks between the end of the Summer term and the start of the Fall term. He added that changing the calendar in even small ways can have unintended consequences. Professor Stewart also pointed out that establishing University holidays for one religion could lead to future requests for classes to be canceled on other religious holidays.

Executive Vice President Martin Dorph then called attention to the University Calendar Policy on Religious Holidays and the guidance given to faculty every year that accommodations should be made for students who are absent from class due to religious observances. Further discussion was then held, including about whether faculty could come up with more creative solutions to allow students to observe religious holidays without creating additional academic stress. President Hamilton also called attention to the cost impact of keeping dormitories open for an extended Fall term, which would increase the room and board costs for students, as well as to the impact on the organizational structure of the University. He suggested that the current University Calendar Policy on Religious Holidays could be reviewed with an aim to identify adjustments that could be made so that accommodations for students are more effective.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, the following resolution passed (calendar attached as Exhibit A):

WHEREAS, the University Bylaws state that the University Senate will fix the length of terms and vacations and define the University calendar; and

WHEREAS, the Rules of Procedure of the University Senate provide that the Senate Academic Affairs Committee shall be responsible for presenting to the Senate a University calendar prepared by a Subcommittee on the Calendar.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that upon the recommendation of the Senate Academic Affairs Committee, the attached calendar for academic years 2018-2020 is adopted as presented.

Financial Affairs Committee Report

Anthony Jiga, Vice President for Budget and Planning, said that the Financial Affairs Committee met on March 23rd. Representatives from the Full-Time Continuing Contract Faculty Senators Council (C-FSC) and from the Administrative Management Council (AMC) separately presented to the Committee on budget recommendations for the next fiscal year. Mr. Jiga said that Paul Horn, Senior Vice Provost for Research, also presented on university-sponsored research activity and entrepreneurial initiatives across the University.

Committee on Organization and Governance Report

The Senate Committee on Organization and Governance Chair Larry Slater said that the Committee continues to explore the functions of the Senate. The Committee has been reviewing the functions of the Senate Councils as stated in the University Bylaws and will be bringing forward proposed changes. Dr. Slater reported that members of the Committee met with President Hamilton and Provost Katherine Fleming earlier that week to brainstorm ways to improve the function of the Senate, including how information is disseminated. Members of the Committee also met with Senior Presidential Fellow Ellen Schall to discuss ways to improve communication between the Senate and the Board of Trustees. Dr. Slater noted that members of the Committee will next meet with John Beckman, Vice President for Public Affairs, to look at ways to improve the Senate website. He said that the Committee will finalize its recommendations for the Senate Executive Committee by the end of the academic year.

Public Affairs Committee Report

Public Affairs Committee Chair Arthur Tannenbaum said that the Committee is working on its annual report on campus security, which will be presented at the April Senate meeting.

COUNCIL REPORTS

Administrative Management Council

AMC Chair Raymond Lutzky reported that the AMC's meeting on March 4th included a presentation by Mr. Jiga on NYU's finances and budget for fiscal year 2018. At its final General Meeting of the year on April 4th, Dr. Lutzky said that the AMC will elect its officers for 2017-2018 and hear from Sabrina Ellis, Vice President for Human Resources. He added that the AMC Representative election process for units with 2017-2019 terms has concluded and candidates for AMC Senator positions will present themselves for consideration at the AMC end-of-year luncheon on May 4th.

Dr. Lutzky reminded the Senate that AMC's 2017 "Adopt a School" book drive continues

through May. He invited the NYU community to contribute books to build a library for the Charles A. Dorsey School (P.S. 67) located near the Brooklyn campus. Those who would like to participate can purchase a book from the list on the AMC website or from the AMC book display at the NYU Bookstore (with a 20% discount) and leave the book at the bookstore in the donation box behind the register. Dr. Lutzky added that books will also be available for purchase outside Rosenthal Pavilion at noon on May 4th.

Deans Council

Deans Council Chair Thomas Carew gave the Deans Council report of its most recent meeting on March 22nd. He said several members of the C-FSC Steering Committee joined the meeting for a wide-ranging discussion that was both mutually beneficial and highly informative. The Deans Council also considered several issues concerning the similarities and differences of policies and planning within NYU's Schools.

Tenured/Tenure Track Faculty Senators Council (T-FSC)

T-FSC Chair Allen Mincer reported on the T-FSC's meetings on February 23rd and March 23rd. He said the T-FSC approved its Personnel Policies and Tenure Modifications Committee's review of the NYU Shanghai Guidelines on the Full-Time Continuing Contract Faculty Review Process for Reappointment and Promotion. The T-FSC also approved its Finance and Policy Planning Committee's budget recommendation to the Senate Financial Affairs Committee.

Professor Mincer said the Council's Educational Policies and Faculty Student Relations Committee reported on a College of Arts and Science initiative directed toward recruitment, retention, and intra-community support of undergraduates who are the first in their family to undertake university study, and the Committee was encouraged by the T-FSC to identify opportunities to work towards strengthening such initiatives throughout the University. Craig Jolley, Director of Student Conduct and Community Standards, also briefed the T-FSC and answered questions on a new policy being developed on non-academic student misconduct.

Professor Mincer reported that the T-FSC was also visited by representatives of the SSC to discuss a SSC resolution to improve communication between students and the Board of Trustees and to have student membership on the Board. Speaking on behalf of the T-FSC members, Professor Mincer said they were impressed by the work that had been done and the thought the students had put into these issues.

Full-Time Continuing Contract Faculty Senators Council

C-FSC Chair Fred Carl provided the report of the Council's most recent meeting on March 28th. He said the C-FSC approved a set of recommendations for the Senate Financial Affairs Committee prepared by its Finance and Policy Planning Committee. The Council also previewed the inaugural C-FSC Newsletter, which was created by its new Communications Committee.

Professor Carl said that Mr. Jolley gave a presentation to the C-FSC on proposed revisions to the Student Code of Conduct, answering questions and addressing concerns of the Council. Student Senator-at-Large Husniye Cogur and student Drew Weber also gave a presentation on the SSC Resolution on Student Representation on the University Board of Trustees and answered questions from the Council.

Speaking on behalf of the C-FSC, Professor Carl congratulated the six recipients of the 2016-2017 NYU Distinguished Teaching Award, noting that five of the six recognized are continuing contract faculty members with three of those being members of the C-FSC.

Student Senators Council

SSC Chair Ryan Thomas said that the SSC approved a resolution to advocate for student representation on the University Board of Trustees, which was drafted in coordination with several student groups. He offered to share the resolution with interested members of the Senate. At the SSC meeting later that day, Mr. Thomas said that several resolutions will be considered including designating NYU a sanctuary campus and divestment from private prisons. Mr. Thomas said that the SSC is also coordinating Spring elections.

INFORMATION SECURITY UPDATE

President Hamilton invited Len Peters, Vice President and Chief Information Officer, to provide an information security update. Mr. Peters said that his presentation would focus on three important areas: 1) the work of the Information Security Advisory Group (ISAG), which is a cross-functional team that looks at security policy and programs; 2) multi-factor authentication (MFA), which adds a second layer of security to help prevent NYU accounts from being compromised; and 3) awareness.

Mr. Peters said that the University is taking a risk-based approach to information security, analyzing the probability and potential impact of each risk. He then went through some of the known risks, including lower risk items such as spam propagation and high risk items such as open ports. He said that open ports are sometimes created when users install software, and hackers can then use the open port to infiltrate the computer. Mr. Peters added that since all NYU computers are connected through a single network, one compromised device can impact the entire network. He then shared a roadmap with a timeline for addressing the challenges the University faces over the next few years and highlighted the critical actions that will be executed in the immediate and short-term.

Mr. Peters next invited questions and discussion from the Senate. A comment was made that some research has shown that requiring users to regularly change passwords can actually decrease security in that users then tend to choose passwords that are easy to remember or write them down. In response to a question about why awareness was listed as a medium-level risk, Mr. Peters noted that accounts are often compromised when users click on deceptive email links and disclose their log-in credentials, and so raising awareness can help decrease these issues.

The Senate engaged in additional discussion about MFA and how it will be expanded. Mr. Peters said that MFA will ultimately be employed across all NYU systems that require users to log in with their NYU credentials. He emphasized the importance of requiring MFA for all users connected to the NYU network since if one computer is compromised then it can impact the whole network. Kitty Bridges, Associate Vice President, Service, Security, and Compliance, explained that MFA will require a physical device, such as a mobile phone, tablet, or landline phone, to verify the user's identity, but that there are alternatives for those who might not have access to any of these devices. She added that MFA has been tested at NYU's global locations, and that special arrangements can be made if necessary during international travel to other locations.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

President Hamilton discussed the important work being done to review how the Senate functions and ways for the Board to connect to the wider NYU community. He said that a number of people in the room have been involved in meetings with the Board as part of an outreach initiative aimed at the Board having a more direct connection with the different constituencies of the University, and that the outreach will continue over the coming weeks.

President Hamilton announced that Phillip Harper has been appointed Dean of the Graduate School of Arts and Science, effective July 1, 2017.

President Hamilton then gave an update on some of the recent developments in Washington, DC. He said that the second Executive Order on immigration that bans travel from six majority-Muslim countries is being challenged in courts. He encouraged members of the Senate to read the amicus brief that NYU submitted in support of two lawsuits challenging the most recent version of the Executive Order, and he thanked General Counsel Terrance Nolan and the attorneys from Proskauer Rose LLP for their fine work on the brief.

In regard to President Trump's budget proposal, President Hamilton pointed to an op-ed he wrote about the impact on funding for science research that was published in the Washington Post. NYU's new technology center in Brooklyn was also highlighted in a recent piece by the New York Times, along with new buildings for Columbia University and Cornell. In addition, President Hamilton reported that NYU has signed on as a partner for the March for Science taking place in Washington, DC on April 22nd, and that he will participate in the march along with others from the NYU community.

President Hamilton then gave a brief update on the University's affordability initiative, noting that NYU's *Accelerate* program, which offers a more structured approach for NYU undergraduates to follow alternative pathways for graduating in less than four years, was recently featured in an article by the New York Times, and President Hamilton was interviewed for a NBC Nightly News piece on the same topic. President Hamilton then announced that the financial education platform iGrad is now live on the NYU website and available to students, parents, faculty, staff, and alumni.

President Hamilton concluded his report by announcing the distinguished individuals who will be honored at this year's Commencement. The Honorary Degree recipients include Pharrell Williams, musician, songwriter, and producer, receiving a Doctor of Fine Arts degree, honoris causa, and serving as the Commencement speaker; Thomas Frieden, physician, public health leader, and former head of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, receiving a Doctor of Science degree, honoris causa; Jean-Marie Pierre Lehn, Nobel Prize-winning chemist and professor at the University of Strasbourg Institute for Advanced Study, receiving a Doctor of Science, honoris causa; the Honorable Barbara Mikulski, first democratic woman Senator elected in her own right and the longest serving woman Senator in U.S. history when she retired, receiving a Doctor of Humane Letters, honoris causa; the Honorable Gabrielle Giffords and Mark Kelly, co-founders of Americans for Responsible Solutions and gun violence prevention advocates, both receiving a Doctor of Humane Letters, honoris causa; and Melissa V. Harris-Perry, the Maya Angelou Presidential Chair at Wake Forest University, professor, and author addressing justice, gender, and race, receiving a Doctor of Humane Letters, honoris causa. In addition, President Hamilton shared that the Albert Gallatin Medal for Outstanding Contributions to Society will be presented to Anthony Welters, an NYU Law alumnus, renowned entrepreneur, visionary leader, and philanthropist who serves as Chair of the NYU School of Law Foundation Board, Vice Chair of the NYU Board, and Trustee of NYU Langone Medical Center. The Lewis Rudin Award for Exemplary Service to New York City will be presented to Carl Weisbrod, the former Chairman of the New York City Planning Commission, the Chairman for the Trust for Governors Island, and a Senior Fellow at NYU's Marron Institute of Urban Management.

President Hamilton then invited questions and discussion from the Senate. Mary Killilea thanked President Hamilton for his op-ed in the Washington Post and invited those interested to contact her about additional activities being organized around the March for Science, including a teach-in at the National Mall in the morning and a debrief after the March at NYU's DC campus.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 10:40 a.m.
